

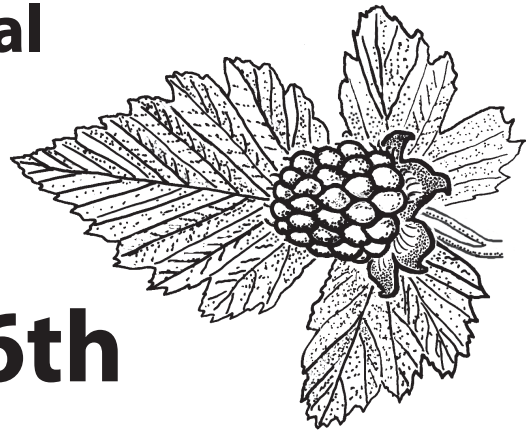
Could native plants hold the key to our ecological and human sustainability?
